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Dear parents and carers

Congratulations to everyone – children, parents and staff - for making your way to the end of this extraordinary half term. The school has been a hive of productive learning, determined efforts and positive vibes as everyone finds their way through new routines and procedures. Thank you for your cooperation in ensuring the success of this.

Attendance in school has been maintained at a particularly high level, averaging at about 98% each day and as we have all become more accustomed to a more precise definition of a continuous cough and other symptoms, absences for Covid related reasons have been significantly reduced. As access to testing has improved, periods of isolation have also decreased in length for most families.



### **Individual isolation and bubble closures**

Work packs remain ready for use on the class pages of the school website should the need occur for individuals to isolate and a plan is in place for remote learning to 'kick in' should the need arise for a bubble to close. To date, this has not been necessary yet; no doubt our time will come. As I write this, I am aware of an increased number of cases locally and also of potential school / bubble closures that stretch beyond half-term for some pupils in other local schools.

Should a bubble need to close, class teachers will be in daily contact in order to set work, currently using email and our Purple Mash Platform. We are aware that Purple Mash is by no means ideal but at least it is currently a platform that allows us to connect remotely and many children have enjoyed using it. We have learnt much by using it more during the Spring and Summer terms and by listening to your feedback and that of your children. Our use of it during a bubble closure may well be different to what



you have previously experienced and children will be better at using it as their teachers are reinforcing the use of its best aspects through their lessons in school. Moving through this year, our 'remote offer' is likely to change as we make progress on setting up a 'Google Classroom' platform.

Following an initial analysis of responses so far in the parental survey and pupil feedback from individual year groups, the situations of our pupils when learning at home is wide and varied and our aim is to provide parity for all, especially where devices are shared within families. As a school we need to engage with all pupils and offer the best quality of education that we can at all times.

There has been much talk in the media about 'live lessons' and there is an ongoing debate about what would be appropriate in a primary school context. Currently, despite the debate, there has been little agreement about what works best! When 'Google Classrooms' is in place, we will be in a better position to consider the use of some age appropriate live experiences to enhance learning and prompt independent task engagement as part of our remote learning package. This will be an opportunity to engage with a specific purpose but will not replicate the nuances of learning in the classroom as we know it. It will be just one part of the remote learning experience in the week's schedule. We will of course, where appropriate, direct classes to the recorded lessons available via the Oak National Academy, BBC BiteSize as well as other recorded materials (e.g. White Rose Maths). Maintaining Teacher / pupil and peer to peer relationships will be a priority that runs hand in hand with developing, building and reinforcing appropriate learning experiences during the remote experience. This is a work in progress and will not be available immediately. I will keep you updated as this develops. We will all have much to learn as we begin to engage with it.



### Digital access from home – parental survey

We are currently engaging with families to get a much clearer picture of what digital access is like at home for our families. This will influence how we shape our future digital strategy and may help us to direct necessary resources to those who most need them. Over 120 parents have already responded (thank you!) Governors are keen to invest heavily in this area over the coming years and are keen to get this right – your responses will be really helpful.

You will have heard much in the media about government investment in internet enabled devices for schools. Last year we received none. We were told in July that we had been allocated eleven laptops should the school need to close or significant numbers of pupils were in isolation. This week we were informed that this allocation has now been reduced to two devices! Clearly, we need to plan our own strategy, rather than relying on this.

Developing our digital strategy will include increasing our stock of digital devices (Chromebooks, laptops and tablets). Ideally, we hope to have spare devices available to loan should the need arise in



the future. During the March lockdown we were fortunate to be able to loan a small bank of devices provided through Caritas and the local Rotary Club and a number of families found this really useful. Currently we have a very small bank of devices which we could loan should the need arise; If you have a redundant device at home that is usable, we would happily find a way to use it as a loan item.



As this may involve cutting a plastic bottle, adult support will be required. Please note that you can also paint plastic bottles using poster paint with PVA glue mixed in rather than needing access to acrylic or spray paints. If you can find a way to attach your poppy to a stem that can be used to secure your poppy to the ground that would really help too. Please help your child to place their Poppy in the Field of Remembrance before school during the first week after November. Our Field of Remembrance will be the focus for our Virtual Act of Remembrance on 11<sup>th</sup> November. The school will also be represented at the Virtual Remembrance Sunday Service organised by the Stevenage branch of The Royal British Legion (RBL) and a wreath will be laid at the War Memorial on Bowling Green by the RBL on behalf of



our community. Poppies will be on sale before and after school each day on the infant playground for a minimum donation of 20p. It is important that our children are able to feel a part of these important commemorations, thinking of those who laid down their lives for our freedom today and joined in prayer for a peaceful future. 'Lest we Forget' indeed.

Throughout November, in the usual tradition of the Catholic Church, we will also remember in our weekly prayers the names of those associated with our families who are already in heaven.
