Catholic School Inspectorate

We were delighted to receive our report which was shared with you last week. We were equally delighted with the covering letter which accompanied it from Nancy Conoby, Diocesan Chief Inspector who said,

"Many congratulations to you, your leadership team, the governors and all of the staff and pupils of St Vincent de Paul Catholic Primary School on this excellent CSI inspection report. The report highlights very well the centrality of the Gospel in the School and the pupils' enthusiastic response to the call to action locally, nationally and globally. It is clear that St Vincent's is Catholic in the fullest sense and works to serve the community. The School's work with the 'Red Shed' and the intergenerational interaction between the children and members, is a project which truly embodies the ethos of the school and should be adopted by other Diocesan schools. Modern society presents us with many challenges but the pastoral care you provide for pupils and staff is exemplary and undoubtedly underpins their growth and development. The thought, time and energy applied to developing Religious Education has resulted in a creative and engaging curriculum the children enjoy and see the relevance of. The investment in your staff in terms of support and CPD, is clearly having a significant impact on the quality of the teaching and learning and will continue to do so. St Vincent's is a community focused on the development of the whole person, and I have no doubt that your varied, thoughtful and sensory approach to prayer will allow the children to continue to develop spiritually and grow in faith."

Academies - DOWAT

As I have explained in previous newsletters, we have been actively engaging with the Cardinal's wish for all Catholic schools to join a Catholic Academy Trust by 2025. We have been directed towards DOWAT (Diocese of Westminster Academy Trust) which will be familiar to many of you as it is the trust that St John Henry Newman School belong to.

We are currently engaged in a process of 'due diligence' and expect the Diocese to approve our 'joining in principle' imminently. At the point that this is agreed, we then have to apply to the Regional Commissioner for Schools, who would consider the move on behalf of the Department for Education. At this point we would be required to enter into a formal consultation process with parents, staff & other interested parties.

The more that we engage with the process of due diligence, the more that Governors, Senior Leaders and I can see the benefit of this for our school. I look forward to sharing these benefits with you all once I am able to, in the Summer term hopefully. In the meantime you may wish to explore DOWAT's website (https://www.dowat.co.uk).

Great Representation Project

Thank you to those parents who were able to join with us earlier this term to discuss our involvement in the Great Representation Project. This projects aims for us to ensure that all pupils can see themselves in both the curriculum presented and the learning environment. It was good to be able to explore these curriculum









developments with you and to share our commitment to actively anti racist allyship. Following the usefulness of the discussions here, we plan to use a similar format to explore a number of curriculum innovations with parents. Please do watch out for these events and come along if you can.

Traffic & parking

Parking continues to be a significant issue on Bedwell Crescent. The local council have increased the presence of Parking Enforcement Officers who have been issuing penalties to those who are parked illegally. This presence will continue and has become part of the local plan to improve traffic and safety issues in Bedwell. Parents at both schools on Bedwell Crescent continue to contribute to the issues at drop off and collection time. Please abide by the highway code and local parking restrictions whilst demonstrating common courtesy to other users and local neighbours. You will have noticed that the local council have provided two 'no parking' signs for us to make use of and continue to monitor the issue. Users of the church car park must also show common courtesy and park safely or this privilege may be withdrawn, as has occurred in the past. I urge all parents to be on board with ethical parking initiatives that benefit each child in our school as well as the wider community.

Pedestrian Crossing Patrol – work opportunity

As you will be aware we have been without a Crossing Patrol for quite some time now, which is concerning. Hertfordshire County Council are looking to re-appoint for this role. Relationships and Sex Education (RSE)

There has been much discussion via social media and news platforms recently in relation to Sex and Relationships Education in schools, with concerns that programmes may be giving too much information in areas that children are not ready to deal with. I would like to assure parents that our programme of RSE fits in with both Government expectations and that of the Catholic Church. Our approved programme is Ten:Ten's *Life to the Full* programme. You can find out about materials used through Ten Ten's Parent https://www.tentenresources.co.uk/parent-portal/. Our username for this portal is **svp-sg1** and the password is **herts-658.**

Currently, our delivery of the programme occurs mainly during the Summer term. Next year we aim to spread the units covered over three terms instead of one. Our programme encourages a diverse and inclusive view of families but does not cover LGBT+ issues. The programme is taught weekly by class teachers and throughout the lessons pupils are helped to develop their own worth and self-esteem whilst recognising their individuality and love from God. They learn what to expect when growing and changing and help to prepare them for change and growth. This includes how to respond to these in a safe way whilst developing their communication skills, especially online. Pupils begin learning about puberty in Year 4 (and then revisit it regularly); types of abuse are introduced in Year 3 and are then broadened into the four areas of neglect, physical, emotional and sexual abuse in Year 5. In Year 6, the programme introduces pupils to what to do if they come across pornography when they search on line; sexual intercourse is also covered in Year 6. In the parent portal you may come across newer materials in relation to Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) and a new unit on bereavement – these are currently not included in the school's scheme of work as they will require further research and professional development.

The materials have been really well received in school over the past two years and teachers have appreciated the rigour of a carefully designed programme, supported by a very distinct Catholic ethos. Parents have been incredibly supportive of its implementation. Currently Mr White coordinates the implementation of the programme – please do make contact with him if you would like to discuss aspects of our programme. We welcome your feedback. PSA - Thank you!

I am delighted to inform you that through your amazing fundraising this year, the PSA plan to hand over enough funding to ensure that:

- We can order a further 15 Chromebooks for KS2. This will ensure that every year group in KS2 can share 15 Chromebooks to deliver the curriculum through ICT. This means that we will now have an amazing 60 Chrome books across KS2! This was our aspirational target for ICT in KS2 and has been realised a year earlier than we expected! Thank you!
- £2000 has already been donated towards a new £8000 EYFS and KS1 project which aims to set up a new library for EYFS and KS1 pupils in the entrance lobby to KS1 and the small group room. This will enable exciting texts and comfortable furnishings to encourage a great love for reading for our children.

The PSA and the school are working very closely together to reach these targets (and have another significant KS2 reading project up our sleeve if we achieve our goals sooner than expected!) Working together for a common goal, our projects aim to build community and relationships too in a post Covid era.

Could you help?

To realise these ambitious but exciting plans, we need PEOPLE TO STEP FORWARD AND HELP, filling key roles but also giving of their time to enable key campaigns, supported by others. Everyone has the opportunity to give whatever they can of their time for this common purpose. Please help if you can in whatever way you can! Please speak to a member of the current PSA or to Mrs Whitty, Mr White or Mrs Lorimer to find out more about what might be expected and useful.

A **Special General Meeting** will be held at **7pm on Thursday 20th April 2023** to ensure that we have the right people in place to fulfil our Charitable status roles. If this is not possible we will need to plan for the dissolvement of the PSA which would be a regrettable event but one that I'm sure we can avoid if we all pull together. Please attend, even if you are not sure what you can offer.

Capital Projects

Following a successful bid for capital funding towards improving energy efficiency in the school, we have secured 90% funding to replace lighting with a more energy efficient LED solution in three KS1 classrooms. This will include PIR sensors so that energy isn't wasted when the rooms are empty. We have also supplemented the funding for this to enable the ceilings in the three classes to be lowered as the current ceilings are in a poor condition. This will improve the learning environment significantly and we look forward to the work being completed over the Easter holidays.

Almost a a year ago, I discussed the potential for a full roof replacement project across both buildings. Sadly, due to inflation, quotes came in significantly over budget and, as such, we have been working with the Diocese of Westminster to rescope the project to a more affordable option. As such, after Easter, we expect re-roofing to begin in Nursery, Reception classes, Year 6 and in some of the admin areas. Scaffolding will be put up in key areas of the school over the holidays ready for work to begin in the Summer term. It is expected that this work will continue until the end of the term, causing some disruption on site. We will then look to plan for other areas of the roof to be replaced as further funding becomes available, prioritised according to current conditions.

As a voluntary aided school, we are required to put at least 10% towards the grant funding for such projects. This means that this term we will need to find in the region of £65K towards these two projects. Your contributions to the School Building Fund over the years alongside some careful financial planning will enable this work to be completed. However, we will need to ensure that our School Building Fund is built up again for future roof projects and other building needs. Thank you for your generous contributions to this essential funding stream. Amazing sporting successes continue!

It has been a term of significant sporting achievements, having got through to the regional finals of the national girls' football tournament, representing Hertfordshire and also having represented Stevenage in the County finals of the sportshall athletics tournaments. Our football and netball teams have also achieved brilliantly this term and are performing superbly in the Stevenage league. Congratulations to all!





PE & Sports was a focus for a <u>Hertfordshire</u> Improvement Partner (HIP) visit to the school last week. Linda Chesworth (HIP) visited a number of lessons (across the Key Stages) with Mr Jennings and members of the Senior Leadership Team to explore the quality of provisions, progression, achievement and engagement in learning. Mrs Chesworth also met with groups of pupils to discuss their attitudes to learning and sporting engagement. This was an incredibly positive visit, with pupils articulating the importance of PE for their wellbeing and staff demonstrating how well the curriculum is matched to the needs of each pupil. An inclusive, yet competitive, sporting spirit was acknowledged as being a real strength of their school.

Attendance

You will have noted an increased focus on attendance over this past year from high profile figures in Ofsted and the Government. As such, schools are being put under increased pressure to ensure that attendance that falls below 95% for any pupil is followed up as a matter of urgency. This is to ensure that pupils do not miss out on essential learning. I am grateful that the vast majority of our families understand the importance of excellent attendance. However, I have noted a significantly increased number of requests for holidays during term time and extended leave to visit families overseas. Although Governors appreciate the financial pinch and the increased cost of holidays during the usual holiday period, this does not amount to exceptional circumstances for absence. I am only able to authorise leave in the most exceptional of circumstances (as per our policy), planned in advance. The local authority are increasingly putting pressure on schools to issue fines as a deterrent. Our school wide attendance is currently sitting at 93.4% which is just below the national average of 93.6%. Unauthorised absences are sitting at 0.62% but during the last week of term were at 1.8%. Being accountable for attendance, I will be expected to put measures in place to enable school wide attendance to get pack to our pre-pandemic average of 96%+. Please could I urge everyone to support us in doing this.

Approaching Easter


