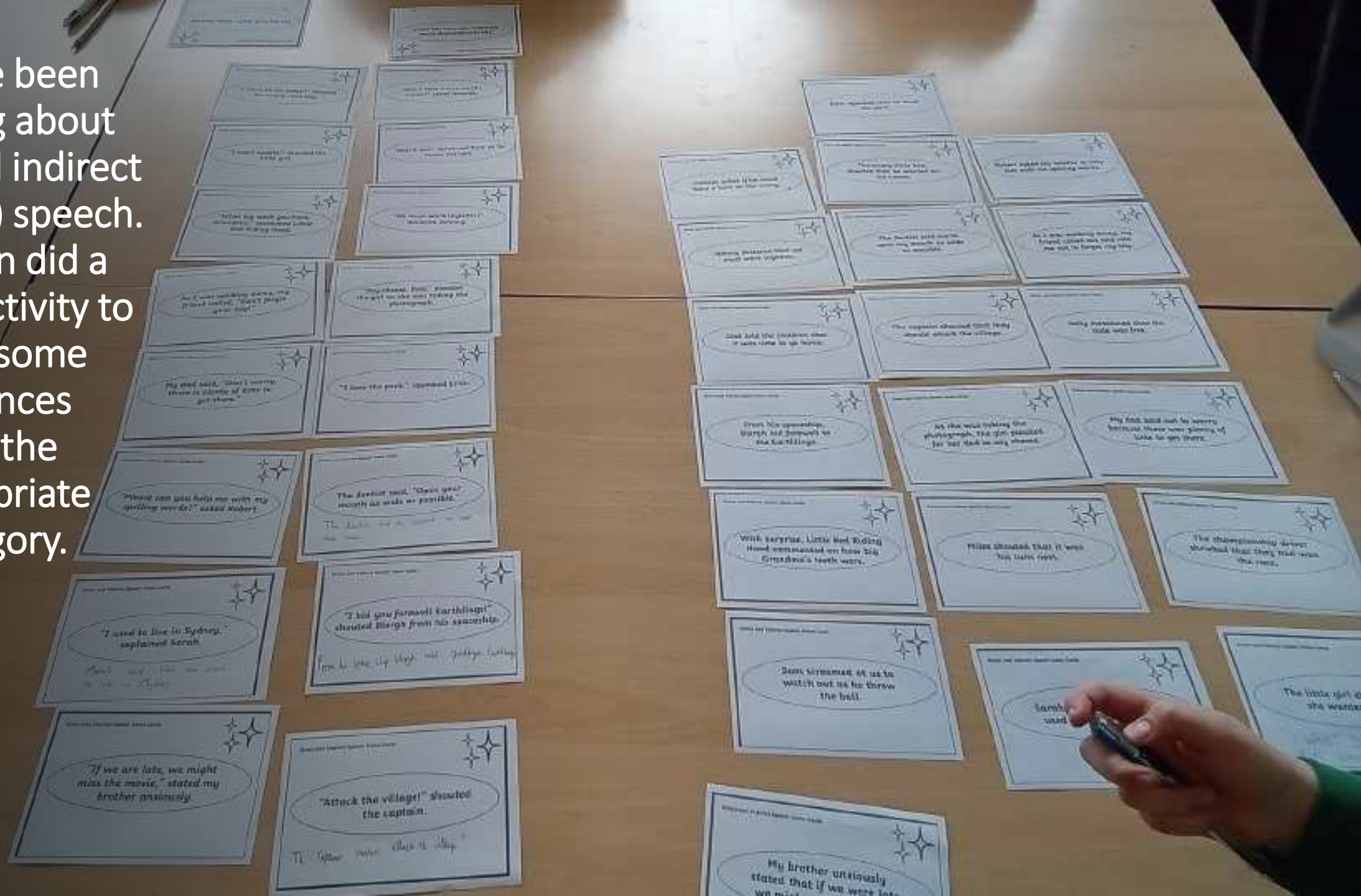


The children in Reception enjoyed taking part in a drama lesson based around our story, Biscuit Bear!



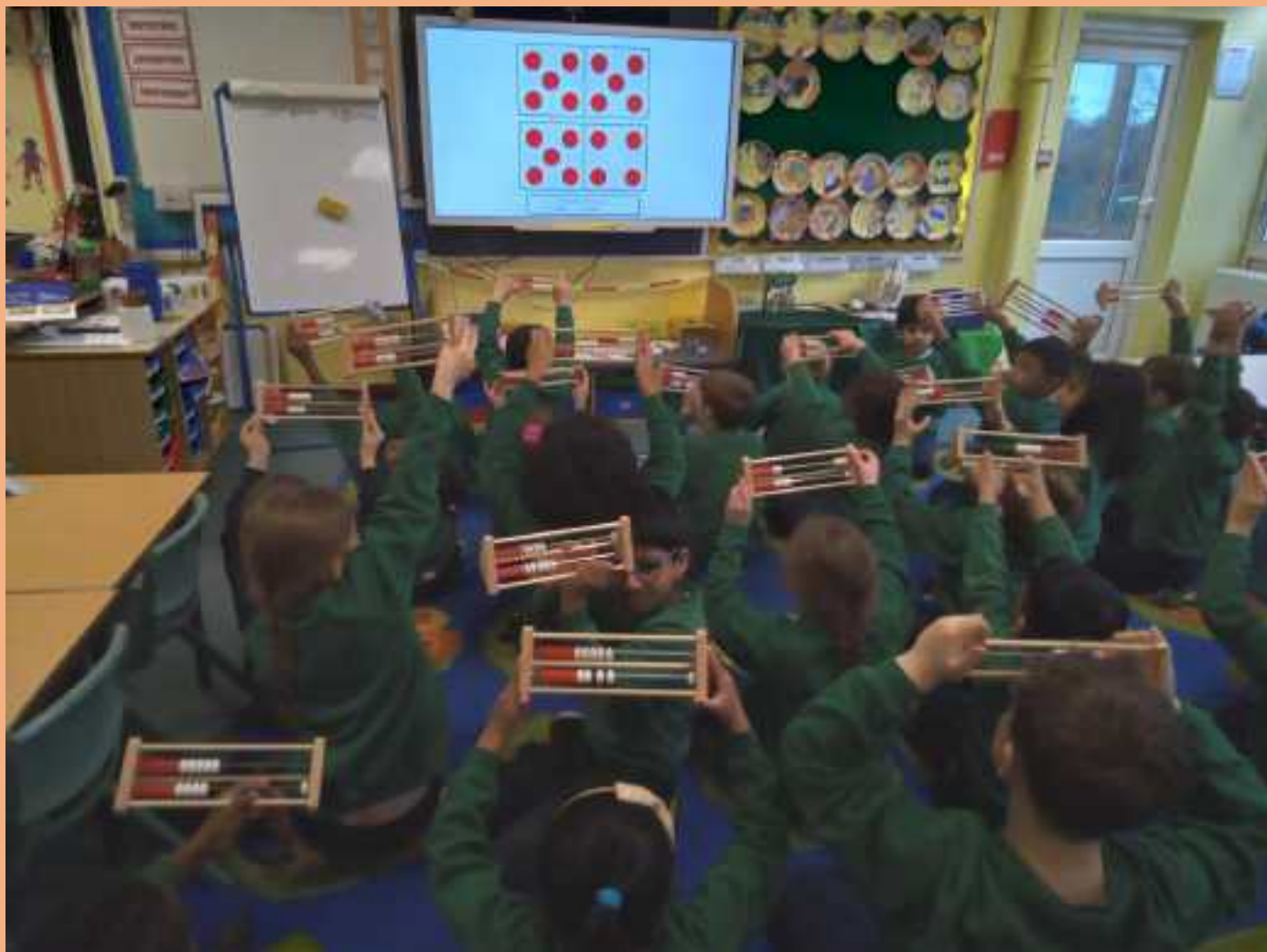


Y6 have been learning about direct and indirect (reported) speech. Children did a sorting activity to group some sentences into the appropriate category.

The children in Reception really enjoyed learning about collage and amazed their teachers with these beautiful landscape pictures.







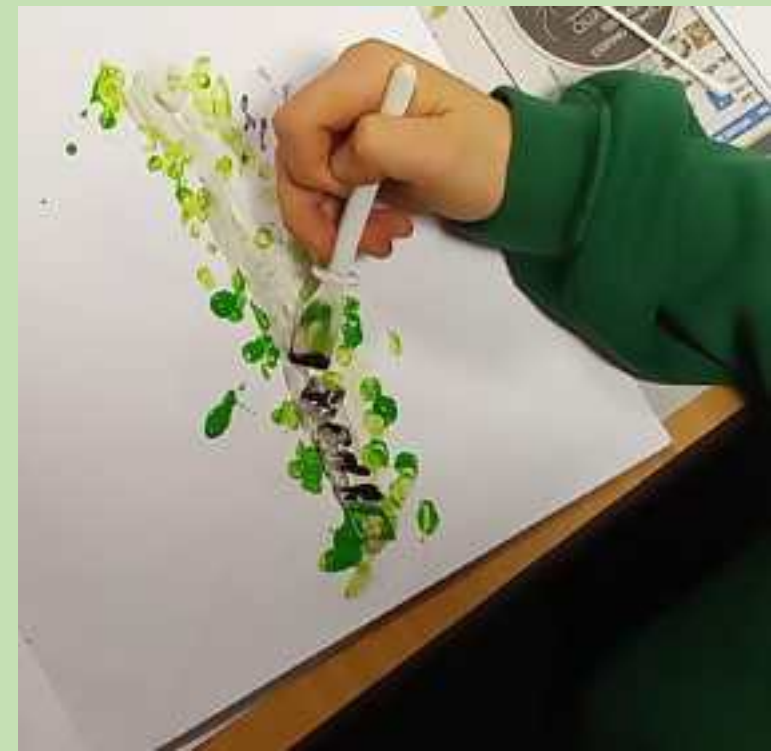

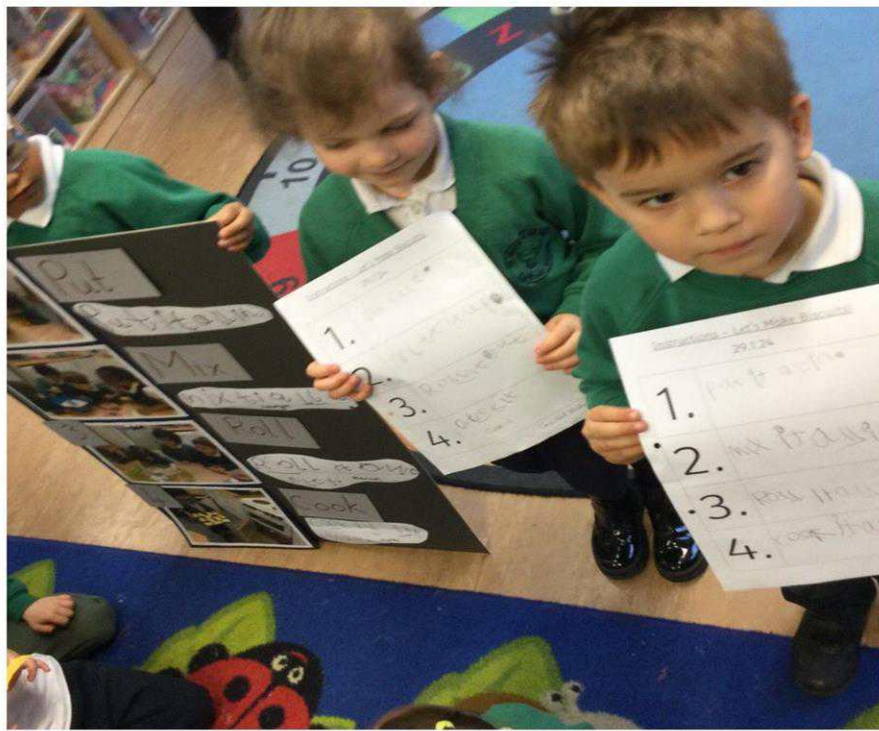

**Our next confirmed activity is our non-uniform day, which will be on Friday 16th February.**

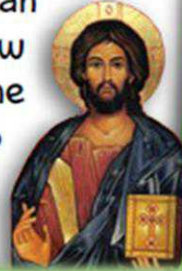
Lastly, we would like to thank you all for your support throughout the last year and look forward to working with you going forward.
