Nepal is a very small country but it is a famous tourist destination and is rich in cultural diversity. It has 8 of the tallest mountains in the world. The tallest of all is **Mount Everest** at 8,848 meters above sea level. It was originally called 'Sagarmatha' which means 'The heaven's forehead'. A lot of people died trying to reach the top!

Nepal also has the second deepest **canyon** in the world - Kali Gandaki 4,375 meters

The Nepalese flag is the world's only non-rectangular flag.
