I understand that my child will be taught about sexual reproduction in a way that is respectful of Catholic beliefs. (Y6)



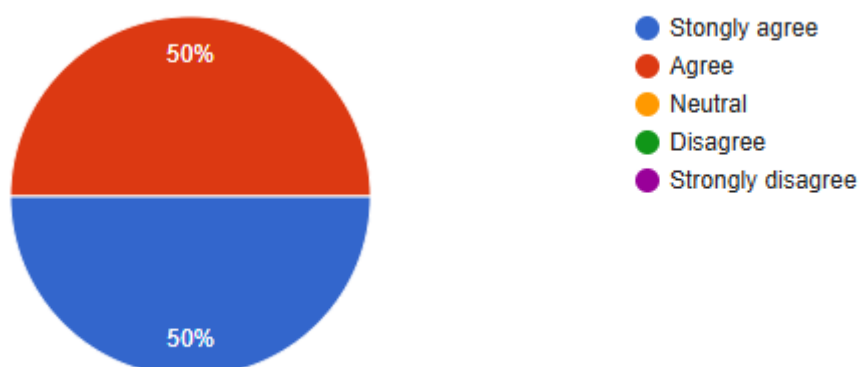

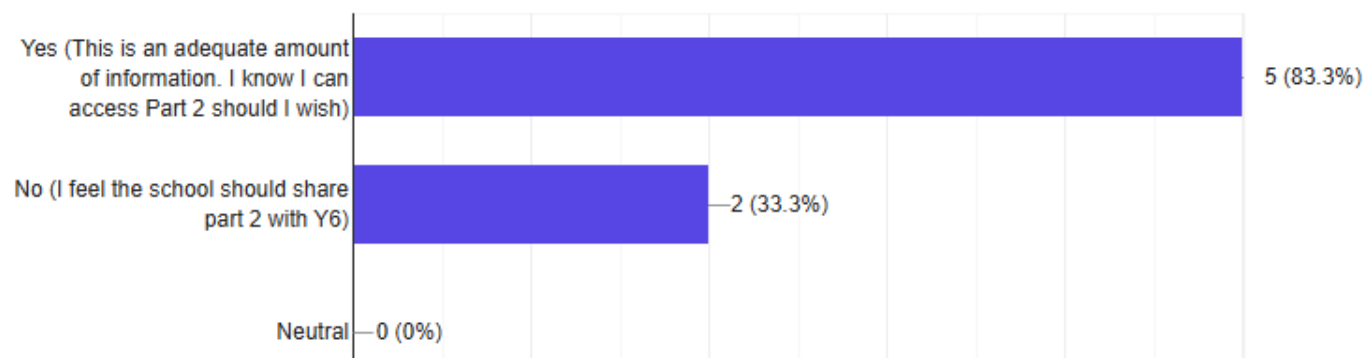
I think it is appropriate that in KS1 children are taught that private body parts are private.



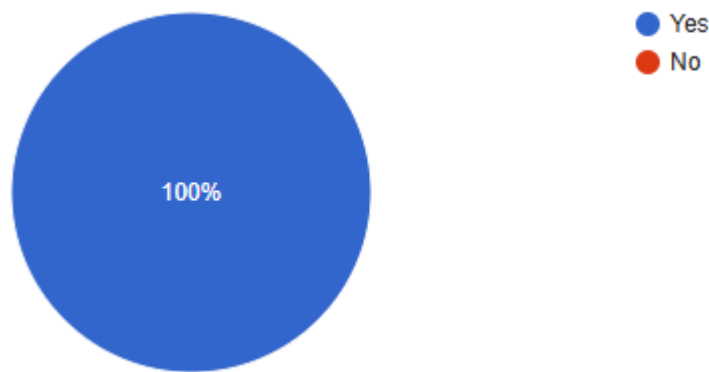
